Leicester is at the centre of the Leicester and Leicestershire Enterprise Partnership area and is a key shopping and employment centre.

Across Leicestershire, there are important towns which provide local jobs, shopping and services. There are also many attractive villages and a pleasant rural environment.

The area has a strong and diverse economy with a central location, good road transport links and East Midlands Airport (the second largest freight-handling airport in the UK). This has led to the development of a thriving transport and logistics sector alongside a strong manufacturing sector. In recent years the health, tourism and hospitality sectors have grown along with the creative industries.

However, most of the businesses are small in size, with 98% employing fewer than 50 people.

There are three world-class universities based across Leicester and Leicestershire, a strong further education college network, and a good choice of schools and private training providers.

The area is well known for having a very diverse population, giving opportunities through strong trade links with overseas businesses.

There are a variety of options for adults to gain new skills or qualifications, including apprenticeships (page 21). Our business, finance and professional services is a growing sector, and includes: financial services, accountancy, business consultancy activities, legal activities, media, architectural activities, public relations, advertising agencies and market research.

Several major banks have a base in our area and Santander has its headquarters at Carlton Park.

There is a solid demand for jobs including finance, accountancy, IT specialists and managers, along with customer service and administrative support roles.

Growing areas include cyber security, risk management, data protection, software services, tech-led innovation and environmental consultancy.

There are good opportunities for training and development across roles, with many entry level opportunities for people

with the right personality, plus graduate entry roles and the chance for on-the-job learning through apprenticeships.

The sector also highly values the life skills that older entrants offer. Employers will look for:

- good communication skills
- strong IT skills
- attention to detail and accuracy
- the ability to focus on and meet customers' needs.

Creative Design/Digital

This is a diverse sector with many different job roles and fast moving technology, with 11,860 jobs across 3,150 work places.

The sector is often split into three parts: arts, culture and creative media.

There is a strong demand for highly qualified and experienced professional and technical staff. Also in demand are: ICT professionals. 3D designers, broadcast engineers, production engineers, social media specialists, coders and data management experts.

Employers will look for:

- → strong IT knowledge and experience
- → the ability to manage ongoing change
- → good problem solving skills
- a creative and enquiring mind

Competition for jobs is high and many people in this industry have a degree. You need to be tenacious and talent also counts greatly, of course! About 25% of people work freelance, meaning less job security, but more flexibility.

Education

This sector provides 45,370 jobs, which link to the local schools. colleges and three universities. There is a shortage of teachers for specific subjects such as maths, physics, chemistry and modern languages. The development of online courses and e-learning mean that there will be an increasing demand for skills in this area as well. For many roles a degree is needed but there are also support roles that do not; numbers of apprenticeships to access the sector are also increasing. Career changers are welcome as many roles benefit from adults with experience in industry.

Fashion and **Textiles**



Leicester and Leicestershire is one of the most active textile manufacturing centres in the UK. Some retailers are choosing to switch garment production from abroad back to the UK, and the sector looks set to continue to grow, as some local businesses are investing significantly in high technology machinery.

This sector includes many occupations such as textile research and development, design, pattern cutter, sewing machinist, knitter, fabric printer, buyer, textile machinery technician, production manager and mechanical and electrical engineer. New innovation means that IT and CAD skills are in demand to meet the needs of high-tech machinery.

Local employers such as **Basic Premier**, Vinola Knitwear and DeeKay Knitwear value enthusiastic and hardworking people, so a speculative letter or application is always worth trying. Some roles are ideal for on the job training, but as machinery and techniques are increasingly 'state of the art' higher level skills and qualifications needs will grow.

Food and drink manufacturing is a well-established and growing sector in this area, with large employers such as Samworth Bros, PepsiCo (Walkers) and Mars. Equally, there are many smaller 'artisan' companies to cater for the growth in hand-made and home grown goodies. Health food offers are also growing.

The area has several thriving markets and food festivals, and speciality local foods (Melton Mowbray Pork Pies, Stilton and Red Leicester cheeses) plus multi-ethnic foods in Leicester. The Leicester Food Park provides food manufacturing space to support new and established food businesses.

The sector has a huge range of roles, including food science, product development, marketing, research, packaging and new technology. Graduates make up 20% of the workforce. and there is a strong demand for skills at all levels - from creating recipes, product tasters, production line roles, mechanical engineers and packaging through to senior managers.

Science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) qualifications are valued at senior levels, plus teamwork, flexibility, and communication skills at all levels.

In demand: bakers, food technologists, quality assurance, production engineers, cheese makers, brewers, sustainability experts, food preparation operatives, process operatives and production managers.

Health and Social Care



This is a hugely growing sector with many rewarding roles. People are living longer with more complex needs and also value their independence, and the increase in the use of 'assistive' technology in this area will help them to do this. Health and social care services are working more closely to enhance local support.

There are over 350 different job role opportunities across health and social care, and many promotion opportunities for people who have the right skills.

The University Hospitals of Leicester NHS Trust is working to promote more apprenticeships within the healthcare sector, both in clinical and non-clinical settings. Other employers include health centres, the many local care homes, city, county and district councils, private health organisations, domiciliary care agencies and community service agencies.

The adult social care workforce must grow by 80% by 2025 and domiciliary care (care provided in the home) is heavily expanding.

Employers will look for:

- the ability to manage ongoing change
- → commitment and compassion
- → reliability and flexibility
- the ability to stay calm under pressure
- the ability to relate to people from a wide range of backgrounds.

In demand: healthcare assistants, nurses, radiographers, mental health workers, midwives, social workers, pharmacists, care workers, therapy staff, GPs, bio-medical and scientific health care support.



Manufacturing and **Engineering**

All sorts of things are made in Leicestershire, from bricks, pharmaceuticals, and furniture to motorbikes! It is our largest sector for employment.

This sector includes technical consultancy, scientific research and development, manufacturing and engineering. High technology manufacturing provides 22,420 jobs and an additional 43,580 people are employed across manufacturing in general, so it's a huge sector here!

Engineering is a broad discipline and roles include electrical and mechanical engineering, aerospace experts, production managers, IT, production engineers, 3D printing technician, design and development engineers, technical consultants and machine programmers.

The number of well qualified people employed in higher level occupations has been growing as products and processes are getting more complex.

MIRA Technology Park at Hinckley is a global centre for automotive research and development. An on-site training centre opened there in September 2018, with options for adults and young people.

Employers value applicants with science, technology, engineering or maths (STEM) skills, and will also look for:

- → adaptability
- → transferable skills
- creative ability to find solutions to engineering challenges
- → teamwork skills
- communication skills

In demand: electrical engineers, aerospace experts, green technologists, mechanical engineers, production operatives, technicians, data analysts, IT engineering, research and design engineers

Public administration and defence covers a broad range of roles across the city and county, such as the civil service, police, local government, fire service, tax, libraries, immigration and prison service. This sector offers increasing numbers of apprenticeships and other options for adults to enter at a range of different levels and progress.

The **county** has attractive market towns such as Market Harborough, Melton Mowbray and Loughborough with strong retail offers.

Fosse Park shopping centre is expanding, bringing more jobs. Several key retailers have their headquarters in the county – such as Next, Joules and Dunelm, with a range of career options.

Online sales are booming, bringing new roles such as online marketing and web support. Physical stores are looking at ways to retain footfall by offering new in store experiences.

This sector offers a range of roles, from buying to visual merchandising. The majority of opportunities are in **customer service**, **sales and management**. Many shops advertise vacancies in store or use social media feeds.

This is a very competitive, dynamic and fast paced industry, aiming to maximise sales, appeal to customers and compete with rival stores.


Online selling of 'niche' products or local produce are popular ideas with adults who want to set up their own retail business.

Tourism and Hospitality



This sector includes bars, eateries, attractions, festivals, events and accommodation. There are many roles to suit people of all ages. The areas tourism offer is growing, with increasing numbers of national and international visitors.

The discovery of the remains of Richard III and the success of Leicester City Football Club in 2016 has put Leicester firmly on the global map. Other well-known venues include the National Space Centre, Bosworth Battlefield, Curve, Twycross Zoo and the National Forest.

Tourism and hospitality can have a high employee turnover, so there are on-going opportunities to get in and progress. There may also be a lot of casual work through the growing number of local festivals and events. Skills gaps tend to be in customer services. and languages.

Employers look for:

- customer service skills
- → enthusiasm
- → the ability to use your initiative
- → flexibility in working hours.
- health and safety awareness

In demand: chefs, management roles, language skills, front of house, tour guide, barista, catering support, cabin crew, waiting staff, housekeeping roles.

Transport and Logistics

Leicestershire is a real hot spot for this sector. The array of opportunities in logistics is much wider than 'picking and packing'; many activities are highly automated with a range of high tech support roles.

The area's central location on the national road network means that 95% of the English population is accessible by road within four hours.

There are many major employers based here, especially near to East Midlands Airport (including Marks and Spencer and DHL) and at Magna Park (for example, Asda, George, Unipart and Britvic). Local developments include Enderby Logistics Point, Mere Lane at Bittesby and Glebe Farm at Lutterworth.

A huge rail freight and warehouse development (SEGRO-Roxhill) is also being shaped alongside the East Midlands Airport, bringing over 7,000 jobs to the area in customer service, IT, engineering, warehouse support and management. The airport is also expanding, both in passenger and cargo - meaning more opportunities!

This is a fast growing sector offering much scope to get in and move up the career ladder, with many entry positions but also graduate schemes. Life experience is welcome across all roles.

Roles include: import export roles, customer services supply chain planning and management, mechanical engineers, transport managers, HR, accounts, IT, driving, passenger security - even pilot roles!

Key skills for the logistics sector include:

- team work skills
- customer service skills
- → flexibility
- driving skills
- creativity companies are always looking for innovation to make efficiencies!

Space and Digital Sport and **Technology**

Every time we make a mobile call, watch TV, or use a satnay, space technology is used! This area has strengths in space with local university expertise, the iconic National Space Centre, and an existing business base. The Space Research Centre at the University of Leicester, offers specialist skills and equipment for the design of space missions and new instrument testing.

The new Space Park in Leicester will be a world leading hub for space-enabled industry, where future space scientists will be trained on-site. it is estimated that 2.500 jobs will be created at the park.

There are a number of local companies here which are associated with the aerospace industries, including Winbro Technologies, JJ Churchill, Cavendish Nuclear, Ametek and GE Sensing. Engineering, science and computing skills (especially in programming and data management) are key in this fast growing sector.

Digital skills are needed in over 90% of all jobs roles today, with growing demands at higher levels; there is also a hugely increasing use of digital technology across all sectors.

As more products and services go 'online', web skills and digital marketing grow in demand, plus cyber security needs.

Physical Activity

This area is well known for many sporting a hugely growing area of sport.

The sector covers the manufacture and sale of sporting goods and equipment, activities of such as research to aid sporting performance. of sport national governing bodies at SportPark



Roles vary, but will include sports coaches, instructors, leisure assistants, greenkeepers, grounds support, marketing, sales, hospitality, and sports equipment manufacturing roles.

Job competition is high; many more people study sports courses related to available jobs





Some locations around the city and county attract specific industries

- → The Melton area has a large presence of food and drink manufacturing, speciality foods and tourism and hospitality.
- → Oadby and Wigston also has a high concentration of jobs in food and drink manufacturing (Pladis and Blackfriars Bakery), plus logistics, engineering, manufacturing and health.
- → Business and financial services is a key sector in the **Blaby** area, thanks to the location of Santander and the Meridian/Grove Park area. Logistics is also strong here.
- → North West Leicestershire (this includes Coalville and Ashby) is a key location for logistics, transport and business/finance, with both the Bardon Industrial Estate and East Midlands Airport here.
- → The **Charnwood** area has good concentrations of employment within high tech manufacturing, tourism and hospitality and sport.
- → Market Harborough is a popular location for logistics (Magna Park) retail, engineering, tourism and hospitality.
- → Manufacturing is very strong in **Hinckley**, thanks to the MIRA technology park and other businesses including Triumph and Caterpillar; logistics is also huge, with the large DPD depot.
- → The city centre has strong pockets of creative design, along with business and finance, textiles, health, education, retail and knowledge based businesses.



About Enterprise Zones

Enterprise Zones are designated areas across England that provide tax breaks and government support to businesses basing themselves within the zone. They are great places to do business especially for both new and growing firms.

Leicestershire has two Enterprise Zones which are:

Loughborough and Leicester Science and Innovation Enterprise Zone (three sites)

- → Loughborough University Science and Enterprise Park (advanced manufacturing, energy, sport science and low carbon)
- → Charnwood Campus, (life sciences/ biomedical)

→ Leicester Waterside offers employment and office space, and Pioneer Park (knowledge based businesses) - including the University of Leicester's Space Park site.

The MIRA Technology Park -(automotive research and development bordering Hinckley)

- → The largest automotive technology park in Europe, with fantastic, advanced £300m test facilities available
- → Over 35 businesses onsite and 510 jobs created since 2011

→ An on-site training centre for the automotive industry opened in September 2018

Many people like to approach well known, large companies for career opportunities, but there can be strengths in working for a smaller sized company. Over 99% of local businesses are micro (0-9 staff), small (10-49 staff) or medium enterprises (50 to 249 staff).

Why work for a smaller business?

- → Your input will be valued as part of a smaller team vour contribution is more noticed.
- Lots of variety you will learn about the day-to-day aspects of how a business is run.
- → Quick progression for those who show potential

- → You can move quickly on your ideas. If you have a proposal, you can try it out without a lot of red tape.
- You can be creative! As smaller businesses have smaller budgets you'll find creative new ways to accomplish your goals.
- → It's good training if you ever want to launch a business yourself. You'll see all of the realities of what day-today life is like as a smallbusiness owner.

New and upcoming

businesses tend to be micro, small or medium, so it is worth having a good look around you, or search online via Google or YELL.

The LLEP undertook some skills research in 2018 to look at future demand for jobs and skills locally. This research summarises some of the main industries where job growth is predicted.

The summary table below shows the anticipated overall demand for jobs and which sectors will have the highest demand in terms of total numbers (expansion* and replacement*), from 2017-2023.

The total demand column is new and replacement jobs; you can see that that bulk of jobs will be created by replacement demand. Locally there is an ageing workforce and hence as people retire there will be vacancies to replace them. You will note that although there is a very small decline predicted in education, overall it remains one of the largest sectors by volume of jobs.

In each sector there is likely to be a mix of both higher skilled and elementary* roles (*those that are routine tasks), giving options to enter industries either at entry level or higher. You can see the research in full on www.bit.ly/LLEPskillsforthefuture

Adults and apprenticeships

What is an apprenticeship? An apprenticeship is effectively a way of learning new skills and gaining recognised qualifications whilst earning on the job itself. A huge range of apprenticeships are available across different roles and sectors.

No matter what your age, adults can do apprenticeships too! They are available to anyone over the age of 16 and there are different qualification levels. A 'late starter' can provide maturity, reliability, life experience and knowledge to the workplace. This experience can benefit a new employer and other staff. Your interest could stem from simply wishing to change careers, or a need to re-enter the workforce. Some businesses see opportunities to grow their business by formally training existing workers; if you are in work, its worth asking your employer about this option to 'upskill'.

Locally more people aged 25 and over do apprenticeships than those aged 16 to 24! The reward is a nationally recognised qualification that has the potential to turn into a rewarding and lucrative career.

What skills do employers value?

Local businesses* looking to recruit say that the following skills are valued in **any** role:

- → a can-do attitude and motivation
- → good attendance and time keeping
- → organisational skills
- → IT skills
- → team working skills
- → customer service skills
- → flexibility
- literacy and numeracy skills.

Employers are also keen to see any **previous work experience**, **or voluntary work** from applicants. You can check out local volunteering opportunities on **www.volunteerleicestershire.org.uk** or pop into Voluntary Action LeicesterShire (VAL) at 9 Newarke Street, Leicester LE1 5SN. VAL has many partners and may have employability projects that can help you.

Employers can receive many applications for vacancies, hence candidates need to make sure that their application or CV stands out, by **checking spelling, answering questions fully and taking time to research the company.** It is important for applicants to show evidence of how they meet the **needs of the person specification** that the company is looking for. With job search activity, it is far more **effective to send out two or three CVs that are individually personalised** to a company rather than sending out 10 or 15 'standard' CVs.

Large local companies tend to receive the most applications, as they are well known.

However as there are far more micro, small or medium sized companies across the

city and county, it is well worth researching smaller, lesser known companies and sending in a CV and letter showing what roles you are interested in and why you want to work for them.


A speculative approach can really be helpful. It costs time and money to advertise a vacancy, so employers may choose not to do so, if they know it can be filled otherwise – for example, through word of mouth, internal advertising, head hunting, or by already having potential candidates on file. Some employers might have work available, but are just too busy to advertise the post.

Many job openings (up to 75%) are never actually advertised, so a speculative approach shows potential employers a commitment towards a particular job or company. Most job seekers or career changers only see the 25% of jobs which are advertised, greatly increasing the competition.

Local companies often have their own website, with a careers or job section. Many companies advertise positions through social media, such as LinkedIn, Twitter or Facebook.

Recruitment agencies are also another good source of job opportunities, and temporary roles can often lead to permanent employment.

It helps to be 'open' to different sectors and areas of work. Many organisations have a large variety of roles and opportunities, and once employed, employees can look at internal opportunities for promotion, or opportunities to move into different departments. Useful transferable skills can be learnt in all job roles.
